Meet the new Exco:

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Erf 324 : Latest!

Op 27 Januarie 1998 het Mnr Kobus Meiring, Wes-Kaapse Minister van Beplanning en Toerisme, formeel die onderverdeling van Erf 324 in 13 woonerwe, openbare sone (erwe 14-16), munisipale sone (langs reservoir) en openbare pad goedgekeur.

Sodanige goedkeuring was ten spyte van die Hangklip-Kleinmond Raad se onlangse eenparige afkeuring van die beoogde onderverdeling en die gelyktydige verwydering van titelvoorwaardes om die onderverdeling te bewerkstellig. Ek, die burgemeester, Mnr Willie Smuts en raadslede is hewig ontsteld oor hierdie ontwikkeling. Ons het op 12 Februarie 1998 'n onderhoud met Minister Meiring hieroor aangevra. Hierdie onderhoud is eers op 20 Maart 1998 deur hom toegestaan, waartydens ek en mnr Smuts aan die Minister en sy amptenare sekere vrae gestel het oor die goedkeuring. Die vrae is hoflik beantwoord, maar volgens my mening op 'n onbevredigende wyse. Op die vraag of hy bewus was van die feit dat die Hangklip-Kleinmond Raad en die gemeenskap ten sterkste teen die ontwikkeling gekant was, het Minister Meiring bevestigend geantwoord. Hy het ook aangevoer dat die besluit volgens hom en sy amptenare "'n kompromis" was.

Vrae bly pla

Daar is egter 'n hele aantal vrae wat my, as Raadslid vir Rooiels, en sekerlik ook die 97 beswaarmakers sal bly pla:

1 Hoekom het Minister Lampie Fick nie'n besluit oor die aangeleentheid geneem nie? Hy het op 21 April 1997 'n persverklaring gemaak wat wyd in die pers gerapporteer was. Hiervolgens sou "ontwikkeling in sensitiewe gebiede soos Rooiels, Knysna en Langebaan" reeds aan die strenger vereistes van die nuwe kusontwikkelingsbeleid gemeet word. (Die Burger 22 April 1997). Die Belasting-betalersvereniging se voorsitter, Geoff Harris, het Minister Fick hiermee gelukgewens in 'n brief gedateer 26 April 1997: "The Rooi-Els Community was delighted to read newspaper reports that you announced the imminent implementation of a Structure Plan which apparently is environmentally friendly and supportive against untoward development of sensitive coastal areas.

"The RERA boasts an amazing paid-up membership of nearly 50% of the erf owners in Rooiels. Not only these members, but EVERY ratepayer received a copy, and unanimously accepted the attached Vision for Rooiels. We can therefore assure you of our community support for any measure which protects them against 'rogue developers riding roughshod over residents and owners of holiday cottages'. (as quoted in the Cape Times of 22 April)."

Your specific appreciation of our situation and designation of Rooiels as a "sensitive area" is roundly applauded. However, as usual, your Department's bona fides will be judged by the community on the stand you take on contentious developments to which they have currently objected as well as those where developers may try to rush applications through prior to the promulgation of the Structure Plan. Developments will be covered in a future Rooiels Breeze."

Bogenoemde blyk nou profetiese woorde te gewees het. Die memorandum oor Erf 324 het reeds op 19 Desember 1997 na Minister Lampie Fick gegaan vir 'n besluit. Ons het toe verneem dat 'n besluit enige oomblik gemaak sou word. Ek het 'n faks aan hom gestuur en hom gevra om my te woord te staan alvorens hy 'n besluit neem. Geen reaksie. In die tweede week van Januarie 1998 het die amptenare gesê dat Minister Fick 'n besluit geneem het. Dit was egter nie so nie. Hoekom? Minister Fick het klaarblyklik weer met amptenare gesels. Was hy ontevrede met hulle aanbevelings? Het hy riglyne vir die nuwe Minister hieroor gelaat? Na aanleiding van sy persoonlike houding, soos weerspieël in die pers, was hy blykbaar nie gelukkig met die ontwikkeling van Erf 324 nie.

2 Hoekom het Minister Meiring 'n

besluit geneem teen die uitdruklike aanbevelings van 'n verteenwoordigende plaaslike raad? Sy verweer dat hy "maar in die laaste fase by hierdie proses betrek is", klink ongemaklik.

3 Hoekom is geen ag geslaan op die wense van die gemeenskap en die besware van omgewingsorganisasies in hierdie aangeleentheid nie? (Ook twee staatsdepartmente het teen hierdie ondervredeling beswaar gemaak.)

Ek het nie antwoorde hierop nie. Dit is almal vrae wat u geregtig is om te vra en waarop die Provinsiale Regering aan u 'n antwoord verskuldig is.

Comments from the chair:

Having been involved in the negotiations about erf 324 leading up to the infamous decision against the wishes of the community and the local authority and now having read our councillor's report, the RERA feels it must ask one direct question of the provincial authorities:

Have Rooiels and its ratepayers been the victim of party political expediency, where the objections of such a high percentage of ratepayers as well as the local authority are ignored in favour of the wishes of one person – the Developer?

This is especially so if there is any truth in the rumour that the owner is already trying to sell erf 324 ... obviously at a substantial profit! So much for Mr Nel's assurances that "all he wanted of the subdivision was a few plots for his immediate family."

We have not heard the last of this unfortunate saga!

Soneringskaart

Na 'n lang deelnemende proses is die Soneringskaart vir Rooiels in Januarie 1998 deur die Hangklip-Kleinmond Raad goedgekeur, tesame met 'n lys van aanbevelings wat ook nou verder deur die munisipaliteit administratief gehanteer moet word.

Ek haal uit die verslag aan:

5.2.1 ERF 1

This property is undeveloped, in a natural state and situated at the edge of Rooiels overlooking the Rooiels River. It is owned by the Dept of Cape Nature Conservation who will support its designation as a nature area. It is recommended that Erf 1 be established as a local nature reserve in terms of section 7(5) of the Nature and Environmental Conservation Ordinance, 19/1974. The property is zoned Open Space Zone III, but its status as a nature reserve should be gazetted in a similar way to other nature reserves in Rooiels.

5.2.2 ERVEN 9 AND 12

The township was laid out with Camp Road designed to provide access to properties east of Clarence Drive. Level differences, the curvature of Clarence Drive and stormwater drains mean that Camp Road is not usable. As a consequence Erven 9 and 12 were acquired by the Roads Trustee and a road has been constructed over these properties. These properties are zoned for a public street, i.e. Transport Zone II, but it is recommended that negotiations be initiated to transfer these erven to the local authority so that they have the same ownership as other roads in Rooiels.

5.2.3 ERF 11

Erf 11 belongs to the Overberg District Council acting as trustees for the local authority and it is zoned as Authority Zone. A number of uses have been suggested for this property including: public open space, community hall, church.

Council needs to decide on the planned use of the property and appropriate rezoning may then be necessary. In the meantime, we recommend that negotiations start for the acquisition of this property by the Hangklip-Kleinmond Municipality.

5.2.4 ERF 29

The title deed refers to government use on this site and it is understood that it is owned by the Dept of Cape Nature Conservation. Authority Zone is the only zoning option, but if the Dept of Cape Nature Conservation is willing, the property could be transferred to the Municipality and allocated for community use. Depending on the nature of that community use, rezoning can be considered. The property could also be sold as a residential erf (after rezoning) and the funds used for local community purposes. Council should start negotiations to acquire this property.

5.2.5 ERVEN 45 & 46

A lane is situated between erven 45 & 46 to serve as access from Lovers Walk to the lagoon. However we understand that the lane is at present between erven 46 and 47 in frequent use. As a result, the zoning map and Surveyor General's diagram are not consistent with the existing use on the ground. There appears to be no reason in

principle why this lane should not be retained in its position between erven 46 and 47, but the Surveyor General diagrams should be amended to reflect this situation. This will involve a process for the closure of a public place and allenation of land.

5.2.6 ROAD CLOSURES

Certain roads in Rooiels have not been constructed and will never be required as a public street. These include portions of Camp Road and River View Road. In addition a portion of Arctotis Road has not been constructed and there are different opinions about whether or not this road should be closed. Council should initiate an investigation into these road closure options, and if it is decided that the roads should be closed, then the correct administrative procedure should be followed.

5.2.7 NATURE RESERVE

There is general consensus among community representatives that the coastline and large open spaces in Rooiels should be designated as Nature Reserve. This consensus has been incorporated in the zoning map, but does not carry legal status in terms of the Environmental Conservation Act. That Act governs the declaration and management of nature reserves. Council is therefore urged to initiate procedures to promulgate the areas identified as nature reserves in terms of the Environmental Conservation Act, to draw up management guidelines for these nature areas, and to implement an environment management programme. Clearly this work should be co-ordinated with the initiative to establish a Kogelberg Biosphere Reserve, which envisages buffer zones and transition zones in Rooiels.

1997 AGM: Extracts

Ons AJV, wat op 27 Desember 1997 gehou is, is goed ondersteun.

 The mayor, Mr Willie Smuts, was asked to give a brief overview of the 1997/1998 budget and answered questions put by ratepayers. The mayor explained that the council had established a representative financial committee which would finalise the budget. Mr Eldie Brink, our wellknown financial expert has been elected to represent Rooiels.

- Ondersteuning vir die Visie vir Rooiels is herbevestig.
- The chairperson, Geoff Harris, thanked our councillor, Julia Aalbers, for tremendous work done during 1997 – especially with regard to the finalisation of the zoning map. Extra costs amounting to R44 000.00 were incurred by the municipality as a result the Rooiels Inhabitants Association opposing the finalisation of the zoning map.
- The meeting expressed its concern that unbridled development in Rooiels would attract illegal squatting – which already constitutes a serious problem within the Hangklip-Kleinmond Municipal area.
- Besondere dank is teenoor Jo Henson uitgespreek wat 'n effektiewe sekuriteitstelsel op die been gebring het, asook hulp wat hy verleen het tydens die in hegtenisneming van diewe tydens 'n onlangse diefstal.
- Gerard Scholtz is bedank vir die inisiëring van suksesvolle vakansieprogramme tydens paastyd en die kersvakansie.
- Die 9 kapdae gedurende die afgelope jaar is goed ondersteun.
- The Chairperson of the Rooiels Boat Club (REBC), Diarmuid Baigrie, confirmed the Club's banning of jet skis and asked members to report contraventions to him.
- Die ingang tot Rooiels sal binnekort geplavei word.
 Spoedkalmeringsmaatreëls sal ingebou word.
- Members expressed their concern about light-pollution and requested that residents keep the use of outside lights to a minimum.
- The problem of builders' rubble left on plots was discussed. Julia Aalbers informed the meeting that a municipal by-law was in the process of being drafted to penalise builders who engage in this practice.

Archaeological importance of Rooiels

Rooiels boasts a number of historical archaeological sites and some of these were pointed out to a couple of residents by Dr Graham Avery on 14 January. Dr Avery, an archaeologist and head of Human Sciences at the South African Museum, does paleonteological research on human, mammal and ornithological history. He is also presently the national president of the Wildlife and Environment Society of SA.

Die RERA het Dr Avery genooi om 'n paar kus veldkombuise uit te wys wat op 'n hele paar plekke op Rooiels voorkom. Hierdie kus veldkombuise bestaan gewoonlik uit lae skulpe en artefakte wat deur vorige inwoners van hierdie gebied gebruik is. Dit is moeilik om sonder wetenskaplike navorsing te bepaal hoe oud die veldkombuise kan wees, maar dit moet baie oud wees. Die skulplae wat deur die vorige bewoners van Rooiels agtergelaat is, is op sommige plekke duidelik sigbaar.

By een van die kombuise is daar potskerwe en handwerktuie gevind wat oop en bloot onder die hemel gelê het. Hoeveel keer het ons nie al oor hierdie historiese artefakte geloop en nie besef wat ons besig is om stukkend te trap nie.

Dr Avery het ook 'n visvywer geïdentifiseer en die klippe wat duisende jare gelede gepak is om visse in 'n lokval te lei, is nog duidelik sigbaar.

Dr Avery was accompanied by Lin Lam, a Ph.D. student from the State University of New York, who is studying seasonal growth layers in the teeth of antelopes and seals. He is trying to collect modern specimens of seal and antelope of known date of death as a reference sample for the interpretation of specimens from archaeological sites. If any dead seals wash up on the beach and you can establish when it died, please contact him at the South African Museum at (021) 24 3330.

Some years ago the Department of Archaeology at the University of Cape Town undertook a dig in the caves above the Rooiels River – an event which underlines the historical importance of this area.

The history of Rooiels goes back thousands of years and at the moment Rita Blake of erf 130 is researching this history which we hope to publish at some later date. (See her article elsewhere in this edition)

Life's a beach at Rooiels!!

Braais are all part of that wonderful feeling – but what begins as a terrific experience can, accidently or through sheer negligence, turn into an absolute nightmare, not just for the participants but for the entire community. Always remember our infamous wind. Every household should be advised to have a readily accessible and functional hosepipe – holey and unattached hoses are not always useful in a real emergency.

I can personally recall three previous incidents where ordinary braai fires got out of control (remember when the mountain went up in flames?), and on Saturday 14 March another braai almost turned into a tragedy in Rocklands Road. If it hadn't been for the prompt reaction of neighbours, the consequences could have been just too horrific to contemplate. Memories are often short-lived. Please be mindful of those consequences. Remember Betty's Bay last year and ask yourself – what if ...?

Bird Chat

Birding is as much of a mix as life is in what it can "dish up" for us. Sometimes joyous, sometimes sad. Over the last year we've reported on both sad and joyous sightings in our special environment. We enclose the CBC (Cape Bird Club) Rare Birds acceptance of a Mangrove Kingfisher (Mangliedvisvanger) - an absolutely spectacular sighting as you can see! This bird is uncommon within its own range and was very special for us as it was a "first" in every sense. What luck for us too that the new Rooielsers, the Brandts, happened to be passing and snapped the KwaZulu Natal visitor - obviously fed up with Durbs too! A superlative welcome indeed for the Brandts.

Last year we also commented on the Rockjumpers (Kaapse Berglyster). These inquisitive and pert birds have made their presence known further into Rooiels along both Ocean View and Porter Drive. They are rare and to have such a healthy breeding population says much for the environment.

On the sad and worrying side: has anyone seen a Bokmaklerie recently? We haven't seen what used to be a common resident in Rooiels, since July 1997. Their colourful plumage and song repertoire makes them one of the most easily recognisable and endearing of all birds. Their omniverous diet and adaptable choice of habitat makes their absence the more disturbing.

The Black Oystercatcher (Swarttobie) is an endangered species, so much so that the Fitzpatrick Institute has spent a substantial sum of money trying to establish just how many pairs there are in South Africa. We've regularly seen three of these impressive birds on the beach, but recently we've seen and heard four presumably two pairs. Good news indeed! Like our much more common Whitefronted Sand Plover (Vaalstrandkiewiet) their demise has been the direct result of their choice of nesting site. In a welldocumented case a nest was destroyed when a film crew wanted a beach cleared of all debris (i.e. kelp, driftwood, etc.) for a commercial. The greater the human population of our beaches, the fewer nests survive. The plovers nest frequently and their behaviour near the nest or chick is quite an event. Close scrutiny of the parents give a clue as to whether it's a

nest or chick(s). If the parent goes into the "dying" act there is a chick(s) about, the more frenetic the closer you are to the chick(s). This week we've seen a twoegged nest and a chick belonging to different pairs.

We were absolutely delighted to see the return of the Black Eagle (Witkruisarend), but our sightings have been negligable and as yet we could not be sure of its permanent return.

Our monthly shopping basket usually contains a large bag of mixed grain. We seem to have several seed-eating birds and their families to support these days. The first curtain opening of the morning guarantees the appearance of our "tame" francolins (Kaapse Fisant) for breakfast. These delightful birds seem very much at home in the security of the garden. This year there have been no chicks from our small flock (or more correctly, covey) of up to six birds – has anyone seen chicks this year?

Our resident Yellowrumped Widow (Kaapse Flap) and his family visit daily and are becoming demanding – pecks on the window are common if breakfast is late! A magnificent breeding plumage with the stark contrast of black and yellow makes the male of this species quite unmistakable. The rest of the year, though heavily marked, they are often "missed".

Any birding information is greatly welcomed by us – phone us on (02823) 28528 with your sightings to keep our records up to date which are annually correlated at Stellenbosch University. Any really keen observers can get a full bird list from us to help us with our monthly counts.

CBC RARE BIRDS

Since the last report of this committee, Published in *Promerops* 229 of July 1997, a further eleven records have been vetted. Of these, one has been held over for further consideration by the committee and will be dealt with in the next report. *The accepted records are as follows:*

MANGROVE KINGFISHER (434) – One bird was seen sitting on a telephone wire in Rooi-Els on 1 May 1997 (JH Brandt – photographed, Alison Ayre & Helen Jones).

This species is known to undertake local migrations between its breeding and wintering grounds on the east coast of South Africa, and it is presumed that this exceptional record must be the result of a reverse migration.

'n Besige Rooiels

'n Baie suksesvolle en besige vakansieprogram is tydens die afgelope feestyd deur die REBV aangebied. More than 60 people from Rooiels who never have the opportunity to go out on a boat, were given just that opportunity during the Boat Club open day. They took trips with experienced skippers and these members of the Boat Club donated their kreef quota for the day to the people of Rooiels.

The Rooiels Sunset Arts and Crafts Route was a concept which appealed to all. For the first time, people from Rooiels could do their Christmas shopping at sunset while walking from one venue to another and find something light to eat or drink along the way. The goods offered for sale were produced mostly by artists/crafters in our area. One of the venues hosted an exhibition by some of South Africa's leading artists and attracted a great deal of attention.

A Fynbos Garden

It has been a hot, dry summer, at times with temperatures closer to 40 than 30. Fierce winds have blown away the top layers of sandy soil from ground not bound by the roots of plants.

It is at such times that I become aware of the workings of the processes of natural selection. Several years ago we planted two proteas of the same species in a pocket of soil between rocks. Neither has done particularly well, the one between the rocks never having put out one flower, and seeming each summer only just to survive. Yet this is the one that has survived the extremes of this summer: the other died. Why? Is it because its roots have found their way between the rocks which act as a mulch, or have its years of struggling to survive made it a tougher organism? What would be the quality of its seeds, if it managed to produce a flower?

For some years I have been watching and nurturing a self-seeded protea, unlike any others in our garden. Last year it produced tiny flowerheads, but these fell off during a dry spell in February. This year the flowerheads became much larger before falling off, and up to a week ago one remained on the bush, so I remain hopeful that we will at last find out what particular protea it is. The larger, well-established bushes have been doing the same thing, losing most of their flowerheads and managing to produce only a small number of blooms.

Surprisingly, buffalo grass which we planted during the year to cover sandy

areas around the house has thrived, even though it has gone for long periods without watering. Each time we visited Rooiels I anchored the new shoots on the sand with stones, thus directing their growth to cover bare patches. In less than two weeks it became necessary to move the stone again.

Likewise, the dodder continues to put out its strangling tendrils, apparently little impeded by the heat and dryness.

Our Erica mammosas are blooming merrily.

THE LATEST ON SOMCHEM AND OUR DRINKING WATER

The BCCC, a committee representing the community organisations (including RERA) has been negotiating Somchem's withdrawal from the test site in the mountains behind Rooiels. This task has proved to be extremely onerous and has demanded great patience and dedication in the service of the communities affected by Somchem's presence in the catchment area which provides our drinking water.

Somchem fired the last shot on 4 December 1997 and are in the process of cleaning up the area. This clean-up includes decontamination of the soil and the removal of, amongst other things, tons of lead-polluted soil. Most of the buildings on the site are to be demolished. The contractors will work according to an environment management plan. GIBB Africa will control access to the site until they complete the contract at the end of August 1998. The final ownership of the land will hopefully pass to a "Nature Conservation Board" via the Local Council and from then onwards the area should be used only for conservation purposes and as a catchment area, when it could one day become part of Kobio's plans. The title deeds of portion 186 need, however, to be restricted to ensure that no abuse of our water source ever occurs again.

Many problems have been experienced with the protocol for monitoring the quality of the water – to the point where all community representatives have withdrawn their support for the document and have agreed that the responsibility for the potability of the water cannot rest with the Community, but with those bodies responsible for the original damage: the clean-up contractor and the authorities responsible for providing potable water.

The RERA has been actively involved in the entire process and will continue to be represented at the meetings of the BCCC. We will keep you informed of progress.

Meg Harrison passed away on 27 December 1997, sadly missed by family and friends. Those who knew her admired her courage to battle with cancer for 15 years. Thank you, good friends, for your help and support, also for your goodwill and messages.

It is everyone's dream to have a little piece of Rooiels and so, without any serious intentions, a Sunday drive in February 1993 with overseas visitors (no wind that day!) prompted us to stop at Rooiels. Well, you know how it is, this little cottage was looking for new owners, a chance never to be repeated, a persuasive estate agent! Of course, we fell in love with Rooiels and started to get itchy feet to expand or be upwardly mobile. In November 1994 we sold to Elida van Dyk, but stayed on as caretakers for another year. History of Rooiels

Sitting on the stoep after Christmas gazing at the setting sun, I wondered about all the people who had seen the beautiful view of the bay before me. I had been inspired by the interesting facts about the geology mentioned by Tony Hall during his walk through the reserve and by the

stories about the Strandlopers. In a weak moment I decided to write a history of Rooiels. I pictured a few photocopied pages, but when I began my 'research', I discovered that there was far more than I had expected and the work is getting more and more complex and more and more interesting.

Sedert die tyd van Christus woon die Khoi (Strandlopers) al aan die Kaap met hul skape en voor hulle ...? By Die Kelders het Die Universiteit van Kaapstad gebeendere en gereedskap van 80 000 jaar gelede gekry en onlangs nog op die weskus is die 100 000 jaar + voetafdrukke van 'n mens gekry! Die Feniciers het sekerlik om die Kaap gevaar en miskien ook die Egiptenare. Die Portugese het Hangklip 'Ponta Espinosa" (Doringpunt) genoem en Van Riebeeck het in 1655 verkenners oor land om die kus gestuur. In 1739 het 'n Deen (Andreas Grove) wat vir die Kompanje gewerk het 'n veepos, "Welgemoet", by Hangklip gehuur en in 1750 het Andries Louw een by "Het Waaygat" in die vallei bo Rooiels begin.

So, ons geskiedenis loop ver.

The wrecks in the vicinity make fascinating reading and so do the stories of the whalers. Did you know that for more than a hundred years the caves at Rooiels and Hangklip were inhabited by bands of runaway slaves, deserters and some Strandlopers who waylaid wagons going over the now Sir Lowry's Pass and stole livestock from farmers in the Overberg? They had a boat and weapons and were safe in their remote hideout. Rooiels even has a ghost story told to me by two people.

I want to thank everyone whom I have approached for their enthusiasm and their help - for all the documents faxed to me and for all the time they spoke to me on the phone giving valuable info. I would be thrilled if I could get more contributions. I am sure there are many stories about the area that could be included. I would like to learn more about the building of the road, the radar station which operated near Hangklip during the war, the prisoner of war camp that was built in the valley.

PLAVEI VAN INGANG TOT ROOIELS

'n Vergadering met al die betrokkenes is op 19 Maart gehou. Teenwoordig was, o.a., die munisipale ingenieur en hoofverkeersbeampte, die kontrakteur en plaaslike sakemense. Gedagtes is uitgeruil en konsensus is bereik oor die voorgestelde planne. Die ingenieur sal nou die finale planne vir oorweging voorberei.

Raadslid Julia Aalbers het genoem dat hierdie slegs as die eerste fase beskou moet word. Sodra die uitwerking van die plaveisel op die verkeervloei bepaal kan word, kan daar beplan word aan verdere fases. Sodra die nuwe ryvlak voltooi is, sal die sakemense werk maak van die voorsiening van parkering vir klante.

Die eerste fase sal R70 000 beloop. R40 000 hiervan kom uit die Somchemfonds en R30 000 uit eiendomsbelasting. Dit sal 'n geplaveide ryvlak van ongeveer 100 m lank en 7 m wyd behels met 'n spoedwal wat ook as voetgangeroorgang sal dien. Die nuwe pad sal vanaf die teerpad tot by die hoek by die Sea Horse Inn strek. Die ryvlak self sal binne die padreserwes effens nader aan die huidige besighede geplaas word om sodoende die moontlikheid van meer intensiewe parkering aan die oorkant van Anemoneweg te skep wanneer hierdie besighede ontwikkel word. Hierdie plan sal ook tot gevolg hê dat die twee gedeeltes van Anemoneweg nie heeltemal reglynig teenoormekaar sal aansluit nie, om sodoende 'n kalmerende uitwerking op die spoed van voertuie uit te oefen. Die kleur van die stene sal by die kleur van die grondpaaie aansluit.

Die beoogde tweede fase sal die bou van 'n verkeersirkel aan die einde van die nuwe ryvlak behels. 'n Moontlike derde fase is die skep van skuinsparkering oorkant die huidige sakesentrum.

Die kontrakteur sal net na die Paasnaweek met konstruksie begin. Almal, veral die besigheidsmense, sien uit na hierdie verbetering en vermindering van die stof!

MAKING WAVES

We are considerably stronger than last season due to increased funding! We now have 7 cell phones, large signboards with the numbers to call to report poaching, powerful spotlights and Seawatch T-shirts - all sponsored by MTN.

WWF has funded us for two and a half more years. This includes 70% of the salary of a Seawatch officer, the running costs for his vehicle and project running expenses.

We have bought a second-hand vehicle for our Seawatch officer.

Poachers have been active in the marine reserve and also along the smallholdings between Pringle Bay and Rooiels. Fortunately the dilligent work of Mike, Pierre, Craig, Frank, Estelle and other Seawatch members resulted in several poachers being caught.

Mike and his wife are also helping the Sea Fisheries' research team by measuring all the shells of the poached perlemoen. These shells are found in heaps in the bushes or wash up on the beach. Very smelly work at times!

We are working to get a JUNIOR SEAWATCH off the ground. In the Kleinmond area it is running well under the guidance of Norris Schneider and is called "The Surfing and Seawatch Club".

There will be Junior Seawatch activities at Rooiels during the April holidays.

The enthusiastic and creative actions of our members is the biggest asset Seawatch has!

WE DO NEED MORE MEMBERS!

You can help conserve our marine resources by doing the following:

- becoming an active member of Seawatch;
- distributing our information leaflets to the public;
- reporting suspected poachers to Seawatch (083 212 2252/3);
- checking and signing off divers' or fishermen's permits (it prevents them

from going in twice or more times a day);

- recruiting new members for Seawatch; and
- getting adults and children to attend sea workshops.

Thank you to everyone of you who helped SEAWATCH/SEEWAG by informing the public, policing catches and reporting poaching in the past. Your actions made a difference in changing the "culture of poaching". We aim to replace it with a "culture of community involvement" in protecting and maintaining our marine

NEW LEGISLATION

Many recreational divers were very upset about the new legislation which prevented them from taking their quota during the week. The new law came upon them very suddenly and with no public debate or clarification.

We have been used to being able to dive daily during the season for so long that we think of it as our right. However, if we compare it with the laws in other countries, it places the issue in a different perspective.

In Australia one obtains a permit to remove only ten perlemoen of a specific species per year and on one prescribed day only – irrespective of the weather on that day.

In California all recreational and commercial diving for perlemoen has been banned from San Diego to San Francisco (more than 2000 miles of coastline). Two species of perlemoen have already become extinct.

In our area we only have between 1% and 5% of the perlemoen left, we had 20 years ago, and under serious threat. The laws are an attempt to rectify past inequalities of the quota systems and to protect the species from extinction.

As ons vir ons nageslagte perlemoen wil verseker sal ons self meer ekonomies moet wees met die uithaal daarvan.

Help asseblief met die beskerming van perlemoen sodat daar genoeg is vir ons almal, binne die wet.

ROOIELS BOAT CLUB

The recently introduced measure to limit time for catching kreef is the hottest news for boat owners at present. Both boat catching and diving for kreef and perlemoen, is limited to weekends and public holidays between the hours of 8am and 4pm. Good for stocks in the water, no doubt, and it will make life for poachers more difficult, but for the law-abiding REBC members it is frustrating not to be able to go out on a Friday afternoon or for a sunset catch. The 8am start won't bother too many of us.

We had a successful open day on 28 December and you can diarise Sunday 27 December this year for another one. About 60 people went out to sea with members of the REBC and we had no shortage of skippers voluntering for this event.

Our AGM is on Easter Saturday at erf 101 and, as always, Rooiels erf owners are welcome.

Finally, do note the end of the perlemoen and kreef seasons – 13 April and 30 April respectively.

THE SEVEN WONDERS OF ROOIELS

<u>One</u> Klein-Hangklip Mountain, especially its pristine southern face and slopes. It has been sad to learn that these now face a very real threat of destruction at the hands of a Rooiels property owner assisted, unbelievably, by the Provincial Government.

<u>Two</u> The nesting pair of black eagles and their two nesting sites on the southern face of Klein-Hangklip. May these eagles be spared for many years to come to return and raise their young successfully.

<u>Three</u> The rock monolith on erf 324. Miraculously, this huge slab of rock has remained standing vertically on its edge over the centuries. Now it, and its surroundings, too are threatened as the property owner has decreed that its site must be used as a traffic turning circle.

<u>Four</u> The Cape Clawless Otters seen mornings and evenings along the Rooiels shores. The tracery of other spoor on the stretches of sandy beach give clear evidence of the nocturnal comings and goings of these busy animals.

Five The troop of baboons that frequently visits the village. To see a fully grown babboon foraging for food in the nature reserve while the Rooiels breeze ruffles its fur into flowing waves is to see one of nature's truly beautiful. The baboons are real characters and an asset to Rooiels – an asset that should be admired, but NOT fed, by the human residents.

<u>Six</u> The rockjumpers. These bright little birds with inquiring minds are found fairly frequently along Porter Drive but have been seen periodically within the southern fringes of the village. These birds are usually seen only on higher mountain slopes and the Rooiels area is said to be the only location in which they are observed at sea level.

<u>Seven</u> The sun setting behind the peninsula as seen through a lattice of layers of cloud. This is observed best with a glass of good red wine.
