ARBOR DAY AT THE FIRE STATION

The grounds around the new Fire Station were alive with activity on 1st September when Eco School pupils planted trees, shrubs and groundcovers to beautify the area and stabilise embankments. A pet sheep kept dogs away from the newly grassed area around the braai while teachers supervised the labour efforts of the youngsters. All in all a very satisfying spring morning for Clayton to celebrate the first public engagement at the new building. Final work is underway tiling the ablutions and kitchenette. An official opening followed by a Firewise Public Open Day are being planned as we move into the fire-season.

CRIME

There is a continued high level of break-in crime by the so called window gang". The culprits are typically foreign nationals based in the Strand who are dropped off and picked up on the R44. They use pathways to enter and leave the area. The majority of break-ins have occurred in houses where alarms were not activated. The crime is often only detected the following day. Failure to set alarms means that security forces are not alerted to the presence of the criminals until it is too late to act. It also lets the criminal network know that this is a soft spot target area and encourages more crime. Be responsible and set your alarm at night. Be aware that if there are visiting cars or obvious weekend guests chances are good that there will be cellphones, wallets, tablets etc ready for the picking. Criminals know this! Warn visitors to be careful.

BABOON MANAGEMENT

The committee is grappling with ways to resolve the baboon issue. There was a mixed response to the August communication relating to Virtual Fencing. 49 people responded to the appeal with the majority supporting virtual fencing and agreeing to continue their financial support. Concerns relating to conservation aspects will be discussed in a public

meeting before reaching a final decision on the matter.

The overall financial commitment is so far insufficient to continue with monitoring or to introduce virtual fencing. As things stand we will stop the monitoring process at the end of September to preserve remaining funds until reaching finality on the way forward.

We have not yet found a sustainable solution for operational support of Virtual Fencing. Although the time commitment is small it must be done reliably to ensure ongoing integrity of the fence. We have approached ASK for support but have not yet had a response. We understand from the municipality that ratepayer-funded Virtual Fencing will soon be introduced in the Voelklip area of Hermanus and will be supported by the local security company. We welcome any ideas people may have for resolving this problem. We also need to emphasise that continuing with the current monitoring process is probably not sustainable. The costs are simply too high to manage on a voluntary basis.

We thank Mike Schalit for developing the art work and arranging printing of this beautifully presented fold-out document. It provides newcomers with a brief guideline for living in our environment. Mid morning tea, coffee and sandwiches are sponsored by the Mini Mart with beers at the end for the thirsty. Chris will also arrange clearance of alien vegetation on private land in order to preserve fynbos.
